Dear Friends—

At the end of three days the officers went through the camp³ and commanded the people, "When you see the ark of the covenant of the LORD your God being carried by the levitical priests, then you shall set out from your place. Follow it, ⁴ so that you may know the way you should go, for you have not passed this way before.

Joshua 3:2-4

I'm excited to share the next year or more with you during this intentional interim/ transitional time between pastors. My primary responsibility during this time is to help you prepare for a new pastor. As you can imagine, after so many wonderful years with John, it will be hard for someone new to step into his shoes. But your next pastor will not be John!

To make sure you are ready to receive someone new, I will be exposing you to a bunch of different ways of doing things – not to change you for change sake but to get you used to change so when your new pastor arrives, she, he, or they, won't be disappointed by that phrase known as "we have never done it that way before!" That is my job—to get you through that phase.

I expect some of you will love some of the changes to which I will expose you, and some of you will hate them. Just remember, nothing I expose you to is permanent, not my preaching, worship leadership, Session leadership, pastoral style, or administrative ways. You can hate it and know that I'm leaving when this process is done. You can love it and have a better sense about what you hope for in the future. It is kind of like going to the chiropractor – some of those manipulations hurt, but when they have been done, you have new flexibility and are ready for some new things in life, or at the very least, more able to enjoy the things you most love.

In the coming weeks and months I will be sharing more about the transitional process we are going through and the reasons why it is important to do so. It may seem like this is an unusually long process, but it is designed help cultivate the best possible chance you get a new pastor who will serve this congregation for many years into the future. If you have not already started, please begin to pray intentionally for this process, for your leaders, and for the congregation as we make this journey together.



Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens (Fic)

Kya Clark is reputed to be the solitary "Marsh Girl" who haunts

a town on the NC coast. But when a murder happens, Kya's solitary life among nature's creatures comes under the spotlight.

The Book of Dreams by Nina George (Fic)

Comatose after a traffic accident, Henri Skinner floats between dreams and memories. It is up to his young son, a woman who has kept her love for Henri hidden for years, and another young accident survivor to break through Henri's dream world and give him the will to live in reality.

Lost Roses by Martha Hall Kelly (Fic)

As in her previous book, *Lilac Girls*, Kelly intertwines the lives of three young women, this time on the brink of WWI, and the turbulence of the fall of the Russian Tsar and his family, the rise of the Bolsheviks, and the American efforts to help the White Russians.

Redemption by David Baldacci (Fic)

The newest book in the Memory Man series.

Help, Thanks, Wow: the three essential prayers by Anne Lamott (non-fic) Simple prayers are often the most effective, and fall into three categories.


OUR CARDS & LETTERS MAKE A DIFFERENCE


WWII's most highly decorated spy! Part thriller as




