

### **Black Lives Matter: An Interpretation**

One of them, an expert in the law, tested him with this question: <sup>36</sup> "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" FROM OUR PASTOR <sup>37</sup> Jesus replied: "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' <sup>38</sup> This is the first and greatest commandment. <sup>39</sup> And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' <sup>40</sup> All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." - Matthew 22:35-39

Black Lives Matter is not a political statement. It is a moral statement with emphasis on the word "matter." Whether a majority or minority, the people God created with skin colors other than white matter. Many Americans grew up in a culture that was largely perceived to be white European and such a view of this nation remains in the psyche of many. However, the racial diversity of the United States has been changing for decades. Today only 60.4% of Americans identify as white. Now I don't want to spend a lot of time on the civics of democracy but suffice it to say that democracy is a representative form of government, in which the minority has a "respected" voice. That is threatened by white privilege, white supremacy, or any bias for white today.

While I have a role as a citizen, even more important to me is my role as someone who promotes the teaching of Jesus who said that "loving God" and "loving neighbor" are co-equal commandments that sum up all the law of God. Jesus was trying to teach that "loving neighbor" is the form that "loving God" takes in this world. Therefore, one must say "black lives matter." This is not an assertion that they matter more than those of other races. What it means is one cannot devalue the neighbor based on race. The "other" matters.

Do nothing out of selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility consider one another better than yourselves. - Philippians 2:3

Jesus was a dark-skinned Arab of Middle Eastern descent. If one were to evaluate the value of Jesus based on race, he would not be welcome in many Christian churches in America today and would have a hard time getting a visa to visit.

I don't know what prompts us to think that those who look like us are more neighborly than those who look different. I just confess that there is something driving this impulse. Some of it is driven by nurture/education. But some of it is driven by nature. This

is what the Biblical prophets, poets, and theologians called "sinful nature." It is what alienates us from God. Sin is turning our backs on God. Every time we turn our back on our neighbor, it is turning our back on God.

The prophets spoke harshly of injustice because they knew that whenever "disrespect of neighbor" entered the community it would break it apart and dishonor God. This prophetic pattern, "if you continue in sin it will lead to death, but if you turn to God, you will receive life" spoke to economic and racial inequities in Israel. Jesus identifies the need for a "change of heart" for authentic changes in behavior, while the Apostle Paul picks up this theme (loving neighbor), working to break down the barriers between Jew and Gentile.

In a democracy, learning and teaching the "value of all citizens" (loving our neighbor), is the way we protect community, the body politic, so no matter how demographics change the community sticks together. If we teach love instead of hate; if we teach cooperation instead of power, if we value equity instead of supremacy, if we learn to listen instead of doing all the talking, we may never have to cry out ourselves, "my life matters." Therefore, we value the voice of minorities, whether it is based on race, religion, culture, gender or any other difference, because it assures that we will always know we are valued by God and neighbor. Black lives matter!





## How To See and Post To The Westminster ShareBoard



We had a request for another quick "how to" lesson! This one will answer questions about the Westminster Share Board, where members can post prayer requests, comments, celebrations, questions, etc.

#### Step By Step:


- Go to our website: www.salemwestpres.org
- Scroll down until you see the pink block that says "Westminster ShareBoard."
   Click on the word "HERE". You will immediately be redirected to the ShareBoard.
- You'll notice the Share Board looks something like a big bulletin board with many notes 'tacked' to it, including Lorne's blog posts.
- Members often add comments to posted notes. To add a comment, go to the bottom of the specific posting and click next to the red circle that says "Add Comment". Type your comment and hit "enter" on your keyboard.

To add a NEW post, find the pink dot on the bottom right of the screen.

 Click on the dot. A new message block will appear in the upper left of your screen. Type your message, then click outside of your message block and that's it! Your message is posted to Share Board.
