Grace and peace to you Westminster Presbyterian Church -

With the swirling buzz of the summer upon and an improved Covid situation, churches face the work of soulful restoration. It's unlikely that things will snap back together as they were after 15+ months apart. The future does, though, look bright. You and I have the curious experience of not having started the pandemic together (WPC with the interim pastor and me at a church in Washington) but we are coming out of it together. WPC has undergone quite a bit of change in the past handful of years – retirements, farewells, new faces, along with a time of interim and covid. The more we know one another's stories and share openly about where life is finding each of us these days, the stronger the faith community will be.

In the summer months, we will take a look at "UNRAVELED: Seeking God When Our Plans Fall Apart" as a way for us to identify all the things that are now different. On May 30 we studied the life of Rizpah, a woman who refused to participate in the rhetoric of 'necessary sacrifice' and found herself unraveled through grief. On June 6 we visited Peter's experience of climbing out of the boat amidst a ravaging storm and standing up when the forces around him were trying to knock him down as he faced being unraveled by uncertainty.

Please join us in-person on Sunday, June 13 as we touch on the ways that we are unraveled when our dreams fall apart. What is something that you had hoped would return to 'normal' that now appears unlikely?

This summer I will meet with each of the Deacon groups for a time of informal conversation. Contact your care group deacon if you haven't yet heard about your date and time. Additionally, look for an exciting mid-week digital storytelling project to arrive this summer as another avenue to reconnect with members and friends of the congregation.

CATCHING UP WITH SESSION - MAY SESSION MEETING

MAY MEETING SUMMARY

- Reviewed the flow of authority in the Presbyterian church: Session is the responsible party, unless it provides other means, e.g., committees, staff, task forces, etc.
- Reviewed first quarter WPC financial status.
- Approved creating a Task Force to investigate Gifts Endowments Memorials (GEM) issues.
 - ♦ The task force is comprised of Jan Carlson, Jim Pate, and Bill Foster, as Chair.
 - ♦ The task force will establish the timeline for reporting back to Session with a progress report in August 2021.
 - ♦ The task force is empowered to determine short-term investment of existing bequests, pending the development of policies for managing bequests in the future.
- Any further discussion of the use of bequest funds, investment accounts, or any other issues related to GEM will be deferred until the task force has issued its report.
- Approved Youth Ministry Coordinator Vik Schaaf's employment status be changed to full-time/exempt (40 hours per week) during the month of August 2021 (Youth mission trip).
- Approved an updated Rental Agreement for use of the church.
- Approved the Assistance League be the recipient of the next SalemWestPresGives stimulus funds drive.
- Adopted the outdoor worship schedule: Jun 13, 27; Jul 4, 25; Aug 8, 22; Sep 5.
- Adopted the new Report of Worship Responsibilities
- Adopted the new Worship Mission Statement.
- Reviewed the focus of upcoming sermon topics:

Jun/July – Unraveled: Stories from Scripture When Our Plans Fall Apart

Aug – How We Talk To One Another: Paul's Letters for Our Times

Fall – Finding Sanctuary Together: Genesis and New Beginnings

- Summer retreat for session to be scheduled using Doodle poll.
- Deacons: The deacon moderator will become the deacon to all other deacons and no longer have a care group (effective June 1st).
- Family Ministries: Multi-generational summer outdoor activities planned. Brisbee Fund Community Grant was approved by Presbytery.

WESTMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN FIRST QUARTER 2021 FINANCIAL REPORT

The first quarter 2021 financial report to the congregation is a little delayed this year. Many good things were beginning to happen at the end of the first quarter so the publication of this report was paused in order to report them in complete detail. This report is intended to be a narrative without the inclusion of much numerical data.

How are we doing? It's the first and most important question. Revenue is fine. As of April, total revenue received is one half of the budgeted amount and the year is one third completed. Current Pledges, which is the largest part of our revenue, is half of budget and so is Identifiable Loose Offering. Identifiable loose offering is funds received from folks we know, but who are not yet members and we always encourage them to join our church.

Current tax legislation makes it very attractive to make a contribution from a retirement account and many of our members have chosen to fulfill their entire pledge from their retirement account in the first quarter. As the year progresses, pledges will trend toward budget. Our history is that pledges are always fulfilled so we are in a comfortable position right now. Budgeted income is also received from our Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funds and these will be exhausted at year end. PPP receipts are about ten percent over budget as a large amount was withdrawn in January in anticipation of some significant expenses. Also, we are now receiving income from Iris and Norman Austin Endowment directly as income and this was not budgeted.

Total expenses are tracking below budget. Two of our largest expenses, *Per Capita* and Presbyterian Partnership Giving were paid in full at the beginning of the year so total expenses should continue to track below budget in the absence of these two items. Recognition should go to staff and committee chairs for their prudent management of their budgets which result in this good news.

We are reducing the excess cash in our checking accounts and diverting this to Synod accounts. Our bank accounts do not pay interest and the Synod accounts pay one percent; it's not much, but it's better than nothing. Recently the church received a \$407,810 endowment which will be recognized as the John and Jan Alsever Endowment. Our church has expressed gratitude to the Alsever family for this significant contribution. Additionally, we have been informed that in the future we will be recipients of funds from the trusts of Shirley and Bob Ohmart; details will be forthcoming. Shirley and Bob were a loved and a vital part of our congregation. Bob was a past chair and longtime member of the Budget and Finance Committee. The excellent financial condition of our church is, in a large part, the result of Bob's guidance.

As a reminder to those of us who are required to take a distribution from an IRA or 401-K, you can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QFD) from the account and it escapes being taxable income.

Finally, this is my final report to you all. May is my last month as Elder and Chair of the Budget and Finance Committee. Thanks and appreciation go long time committee members TC Curlee, Bill Foster, and Jim Pate. Also to Cindi Chinnock who has taken a leave from the committee but still helps out with check signing. Recently our committee welcomed Herb Sims who will become the next Chair of the Budget and Finance Committee along with his Elder responsibilities. It is with gratitude and a sigh of relief that I pass the money bag on to Herb. This transition has worked well in the past and I'm confident it will continue in the future.

Thank you to the congregation for your continued financial support in these difficult times. It helps put us in the position where we all want to be.

Gloves, wheelbarrows, rakes, clippers, outside brooms, need one chainsaw, anything you need to help clean up.

WORK THAT NEEDS TO BE DONE ON JUNE 12 AND/OR JUNE 19 FROM 9:00 TO 12:00.

- 1. Sweep stairs on the end of the Education Building and under the stairs.
- 2. The bark dust needs to be moved away from the building at least 2" all the way around.
- 3. Small branches taken down by the road to be hauled away.
- 4. Suckers around the trees by the Education Wing cut off.
- 5. Cut tops of daffodils.
- 6. Deadhead the rhodies all around the front area
- 7. Need a couple of buckets to put deadheads in
- 8. Power wash back deck by Solarium and front walk
- 9. Some plants around the front have parts that are dead and they need to be cut off.
- 10. Need to move rounds that are around the grounds to places just off the road to be picked up
- 11. Need to clear sides of the road from Liberty up the drive. This is stiff broom work.
- 12. Adopt a tree or two and cut the ivy away from the bottom.
- 13. Camellia bush near back deck needs to be cut back.




OUTREACH COMMITTEE WILL AGAIN SPONSOR BACKPACK PROJECT IN AUGUST

HENRY W. 'BILL' GRUPE Salem - Henry W. Grupe, known to friends and family as Bill, passed away on May 18, 2021. Bill was born on a farm near Popejoy, Iowa on February 25, 1933, the son of Henry and Clara (Ellefson) Grupe. When Bill was 3 years old, he moved with his family to Alden where he attended the Alden Public schools and graduated in 1950.

After high school, he attended Ellsworth Community College where he graduated in 1952. In 1953, he entered the U.S. Army and served two years in a Guided Missile battalion of the Western United States Defense

Command in Berkeley, California.

Bill married the love of his life, Donna Surls on December 18, 1954 at the Open Bible Church in Iowa Falls, Iowa. In 1956, Bill graduated from the College of Mortuary Science in Chicago, Illinois. Following his graduation, he was employed as a funeral director at Goettsch Funeral Home in Monticello, Iowa. 

GALLUP: FEWER THAN HALF OF AMERICANS BELONG TO A CHURCH OR OTHER HOUSE OF WORSHIP

(RNS) Ask Americans if they believe in God and most will say yes. But a growing number have lost faith in organized religion.

For the first time since the late 1930s, fewer than half of Americans say they belong to a church, synagogue or mosque, according to a new report from Gallup.

Forty-seven percent of Americans now say they belong to a house of worship, down from 70% in the mid-1990s and 50% in 2019. The decline is part of a continued drop in membership over the past 20 years, according to Gallup data.

The polling giant has been measuring church membership since 1937 when nearly three-quarters of the population (73%) reported membership in a house of worship. For much of that time, membership remained at about 70% but began to decline after 1999. By the late 2000s, membership had dropped to about 62% and has continued to fall.

Pollsters at Gallup looked at survey data from more than 6,000 Americans and compared data from 2018 to 2020 with two other time frames: 2008 to 2010 and 1998 to 2000.

The decline in membership coincides with the rise of the so-called "Nones" — those who claim no religious affiliation. Gallup reports about one in five Americans (21%) is a None — making them as large a group as evangelicals or Catholics. Other polls put the number at closer to 30%.

Few Nones belong to a house of worship, Gallup found.

"As would be expected, Americans without a religious preference are highly unlikely to belong to a church, synagogue or mosque, although a small proportion — 4% in the 2018-2020 (survey) — say they do," the report from Gallup states. "That figure is down from 10% between 1998 and 2000."

Gallup also found a decline in membership at churches, synagogues and mosques among religious Americans, who make up about 76% of the population. In the time frame from 1998 to 2000, about three-quarters (73%) of religious Americans were members of a house of worship. That number has fallen to 60%.

Younger Americans are increasingly disconnected from organized religion, according

to the report from Gallup. But the number of older Americans who are members of a house of worship has also declined in recent years.

In the time from 2008 to 2010, 73% of "traditionalists" (Gallup's term for Americans born before 1945) were church members. That number has dropped to 66% in 2018 to 2020. Membership among Baby Boomers dropped from 63% to 58% during that same time frame, as did membership among Generation X (57% to 50%) and millennials (51% to 36%).


Measuring church membership and religious affiliation remains a challenge for researchers. From 1850 to 1950, the U.S. Census Bureau collected data on religious congregations in the United States and from 1906 to 1936 published a "Census of Religious Bodies."

"The Census of Religious Bodies was conducted every 10 years until 1946," Pew Research noted in a 2010 article on religion and the Census. "The 1936 Census of Religious Bodies was the last one published, however, because the U.S. Congress failed to appropriate money either to tabulate or to publish the information collected in the 1946 census. By 1956, Congress had discontinued the funding for this census altogether."

Statisticians from more than 230 religious denominations and other religious bodies also compiled membership statistics for the 2010 U.S. Religion Census: Religious Congregations & Membership Study. That study, which includes county by county data, found religious organizations claimed just under half (48.7) of the United States population as adherents. Similar reports have been compiled every 10 years since 1980.

A baptism in a Salem family's swimming pool?

This is one way in which COVID-19 changed life for a men's small-group Bible study in which I faithfully participate. One member was being baptized; and for public-health protocols, the sacrament was conducted in a family's large, chlorinated indoor pool instead of Salem Alliance Church's baptistry.

That evening last fall was the first time in months that our Bible study had gathered in person. Socially distanced around the pool, we and others prayed, sang and rejoiced as individuals were baptized one-by-one.

NEW TESTAMENT STUDY SCHEDULE
