- Westminster has had a rough last four years. For the next four years, I would like to see the church work on rebuilding church community. We need to develop programs and activities for all ages. I vision a post-pandemic church where there are noon time activities, evening potlucks, a talent show, family hike, etc. We need to increase adult membership to have the volunteers to help with children's programs. To do this, controversial issues that divide should be avoided. For now, no new projects outside of the immediate church community should be started for a year The focus needs to be on increasing membership and getting the members to know and trust each other so when new programs are suggested people are in a comfort zone where they can say "I'll help with that."

- Presbyterian history
- I would like to see a return of various topics for Adult education, not just Bible-based, but exploring topics relevant to our live in our community: Neighborhood topics of interest, and groups that are doing things we might like to know about, like the work of Liberty House, and more in-depth about what's happening at IHN, what does the Center for Hope and Safety look like, and the new union Gospel Mission building and what it means for the people it serves, and the work about Helping Hands and the work it does, and Table of Plenty and how it fits into the work of the Marion-Polk Food Share, an the work of Garten Industries, etc.
- Open to not only focusing on what is liked and valued about itself, but willing to look at the
 characteristics of the congregation that might inhibit open communication and truth telling. What
 problems need to be addressed, before they can be remedied? In what ways do the leadership and
 congregation need to repent? What structural and cultural elements inhibit such?
- Intentionally open to the leading of the Holy Spirit as it studies, prays, worships, and serves. Encouraging spiritual disciplines and small group commitments.
- What happened to children's time during the service? Other churches do this with lots of young youth participating each week
- Discernment. What is good, true, and following God's way as shown by Jesus. Basically, Christian ethics. How do we live according to the teachings of the New Testament in real, practical ways?
- Learning to pray (different than mindfulness and meditation).
